On 23 September 2011, a group of students from the Polish School located in Biały Bór visited Headquarters Multinational Corps Northeast (HQ MNC NE) to familiarize with the Corps' history, structure, tasks, participation in exercises and missions.

the MNC NE staff served at the International Security Assistance Force (ISAF) mission in Afghanistan. Next year the students will accomplish their education on this level and some of them are going to begin a real military career.

“For these young people who already tasted some soldiers’ practice during the previous two years when they participated in shootings or military drills, this kind of theoretical education outside the school is an interesting way to deepen the knowledge,” said Mr. Leszek Landwujtowicz, the tutor of the group.

“They were positively surprised with high level of cooperation among 11 different nations working in one environment by using English – the NATO language,” he added.
